Rushes by Chambers, Small and Abby brought the ball to the 10 yard line, only to be lost on an attempted forward pass. Wake Forest punted 40 yds. but the ball was brought back to her sixteen yard line by Winston. A rush by Manning, and then by Tillett carried the ball across. It was then that Tillett dropped the ball and it was recovered by Wakeley.

Carolina made her second touchdown in the first minute and half of play in the third quarter. Winston again started things by sending the ball across the goal line on the kick off. Wake Forest advanced the ball to her 11 yard line and then punted to the 25 yd. line. Tillett received the ball and ran for a touch down between the goal posts. Helatei kicked goal making the score 12 to 3—at which it stayed.

In the last half Tillett again received a punt and carried it for about 40 yards across Wake Forest's goal. This time, however, he was called back by the referee who was not quite as well up on the rules as might have been desired. The referee had blown his whistle after Tillett started on his run for a touch down, and had blown it without any right justifiable by the rules.

The game, as a football exhibition, was only fair, and had much unnecessary and undesirable roughness in it. Carolina's men were slow lining up, and did not have the pepper and jump in then necessary for a good team. And unless they get down to good hard work Carolina may receive some unpleasant shocks when they go up against Davidson, V. P. L., Washington and Lee, and Virginia; all of whom have good teams this year.

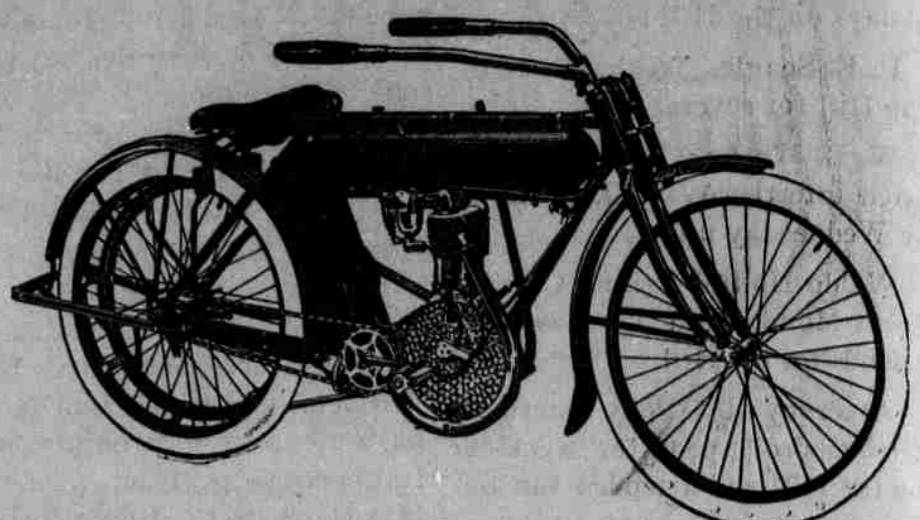
Ferd Duls and Harry Solomon are in Wilmington. Duls is in the merchantile business, and Harry is selling shoes.
