Coffin punted twenty yards to Todd, who stumbled and failed to return. Gooch, on delayed pass, went through centre for six yards. Walters went through line for fourteen yards. Goodhue failed to gain. Todd then took ball to Carolina's one-yard line. A tackle try failed, and Carolina took ball on downs. Coffin kicked outside on his fifteen-yard line. A line shift failed. A fumble gave Carolina the ball, but the half ended with the ball on Carolina's twelve-yard line in their possession. Score: Virginia, 22; Carolina, 0.

SECOND HALF.

Carolina substituted Manning for Venable. Virginia substituted Welford for Woolfolk. Gooch kicked to Chambers on his five-yard line, and he came back five yards. Chambers tore off fifteen yards around end. Winston got twenty more. Tillett went through centre for five yards. Chambers got around left end for three. Virginia was penalized five yards, offside. Chambers got two yards off tackle. Tillett got two yards. Onside kick, and Ritch recovered it on Virginia's fifteen-yard line. Winston got three yards. On fake line play, Carter broke through and Tillett lost three yards. Winston failed to gain, and Virginia held for downs on her fifteen yard line. Woodhue kicked, and Tillett came back twenty yards to his forty-yard line. Moore was substituted for Strange.

Coffin kicked forty yards to Todd, who came back two yards. Goodhue kicked outside on Carolina's thirty-yard line. Forward pass was incomplete. Coffin punted to Todd, who fumbled, recovered and failed to gain. Walters went through line five yards. Onside kick by Virginia recovered by Chambers. Coffin kicked forty-five yards to Todd, who eluded all tacklers for fifteen yards. Gooch got four yards around end. Onside kick and Virginia recovered ball on forty-yard line. Walters nipped one yard from line. Finlay substituted for Hewitt. A forward pass from Walters to Todd netted fifteen yards. Split play through centre, Goodhue carrying ball, slashed of two yards. Carolina got ball on downs. Coffin punted to Todd, who advanced five yards. On delayed pass Walters got four yards. He added two more. Huske substituted for Manning. On line shift for forward pass ball went to Carolina on her twenty-yard line.

Virginia then caught an attempted forward pass. Walters making play. Goodhue landed ten yards on oftackle play. Gooch added two more. A forward pass failed. Redus substituted for Jett. Another forward pass failed, and the ball went to Carolina on her fifteen-yard line. Coffin kicked for y-five yards to Todd, who made a beautiful pick-up and ran the ball back thirty-five yards. Quarter up; ball on Carolina's twenty-five-yard line in Virginia's possession. First down. Score: Virginia, 22; Carolina, 0.

FOURTH PERIOD.

Jett substituted for Redus. Walters lost three yards. Ritch making a beautiful tackle. A forward pass from Walters to Finlay netted twelve yards. Walters got eight yards. Gooch made no gain. Ball on Carolina's two-yard line. Goodhue went through centre for touchdown.
