Some time ago Dr. Royster on behalf of the class in journalism accepted with a great deal of pleasure the kind invitation of Mr. Josephus Daniels to visit the office of the *News and Observer* during rush hours, and also the invitation of Mr. S. H. Farabee, of the *Raleigh Evening Times*, to see the evening paper brought out. Last Tuesday morning the class went to Raleigh, visited both offices, and saw how the work was done in each of them.

The trip from beginning to end was one of the pleasantest, most interesting, and most instructive ever taken by University students. They were most cordially received at the offices of both papers. Every courtesy and attention was shown them by the reporters, editors, and devils on both the papers. Every effort was made on the part of the hosts to show the members of the class how the work on the paper was done.

Not much time was spent at the office of the *Evening Times* because work on the paper was about over for the day when the class arrived in Raleigh. Most of the afternoon and all of the night till 2:30 a. m. was spent at the *News and Observer* office. The class was received with great cordiality. Reporters and editors were of course very busy, but they seemed for that reason all the more anxious to show the class every detail of the paper. They did every thing in their power to make the visit pleasant and worth while. They succeeded wonderfully well, for the trip will long be remembered by those who were fortunate enough to take it as one of the finest they ever made.

We are in receipt of an announcement from the U. S. Civil Service Commission calling attention to an examination to be held January 17-18, 1912, for filling several vacancies in the position of assistant chemist, Department of Agriculture, and elsewhere as needed, at salaries ranging from \$1200 to \$1600 per annum. The opportunities for appointment from this examination seem to be excellent, since of thirty-eight persons who passed this examination in April, 1911, three were appointed at \$1440 per annum, and twenty-seven others

were tendered appointments at \$1200 per annum. Full information as to educational training required, nature of duties, etc., may be obtained from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., by asking for a copy of the assistant chemist announcement.

This is, of course, the last issue of the paper that will appear before the holidays. There will be one issue after Christmas before examinations begin, but the present issue seems to us to wind up the fall term.

We have done the best we could to make the paper interesting and worth while. Whatever our failures they have been due to our limitations and inability rather than lack of effort and attention.

CONSTITUTION ADOPTED

The Athletic Association Also Acted Upon the Election of Managers of the Football Team

The most important meeting for the year of the Athletic Association was held last Saturday afternoon. Both the adoption of the new constitution and the election of managers of the football team for next year were acted upon by the Association.

It was moved, seconded, and passed that the old constitution be abolished and that such sections of the new constitution as were applicable go into immediate effect. The Athletic Council will be in charge of athletics from now till May 1st. The new constitution was then read and adopted section by section. The constitution appearing in last week's issue of the TAR HEEL had been re-written and numerous minor changes made. This constitution as adopted will be printed in the first issue of the paper after Christmas.

The election of managers resulted in the choice of Banks Mebane over Robert Huffman. The vote was very close. For assistant managers Frank Drew and Paul C. Darden, of the sophomore class, were elected. John Hall Manning was elected representative-at-large on the Council.

N. C. Sweaters Awarded

At a meeting of the Wearers of the N. C. Club held last Thursday night monogram sweaters were voted to the following members of this year's football team:—Chambers, Coffin, Crutchfield, Orr, Small, Ritch, Strange, and Wakeley. The Club elected Branch Bock, Nat Cartmell, coach of the track team, and C. A. Clancy, coach of the baseball team, honorary members.

The 1912 male students of Indiana University voted to adopt corduroy trousers as their distinctive dress, in place of class hats. The underclassmen will not be allowed to wear corduroys. The freshmen will wear green caps.

Six students of the School of Journalism of Missouri State University are being given a tryout by leading dailies as special correspondents to accompany a special train of the State Dairy commission.

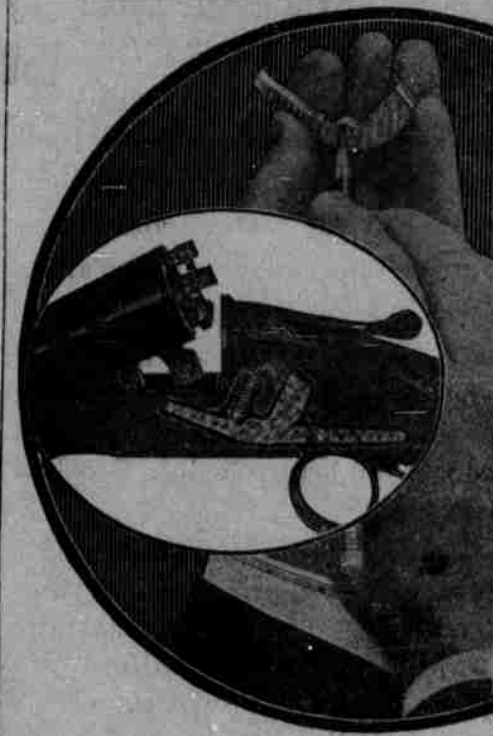

ONE PIECE HAMMER IN THE NEW MODEL Ithaca

If you see more than one hole in a timber you know that extra parts are fastened to the hammer whether shown or not. Our hammer is all one piece, only one hole, no toggles or stirrups attached.
