With a shock of surprised sorrow the students of the University heard President Francis P. Venable announce in the chapel for three bases. Parkenheimer Friday morning the death of ex-Governor Charles B. Aycock. During the few minutes of the chapel hour the president spoke feelingly of the great loss which the University, the State and the nation sustains in the passing of der, Vernon on a flly to left, Governor Aycock. He referred to the magnificent services which Governor Aycock rendered the people of his State and nation, and said that as Governor, Aycock had been one of the greatest and best in the history of North out second to first. . To Amherst goes the honor of giving Raymond his first defeat as pitcher on the Varsity team. One bad inning in which Amherst coupled four hits with one wild throw caused Lee to lose 5 to 3. Up to the eighth inning he held the Northerners to four scattered hits, but in the eighth he gave a base on balls, made one error, and allowed four hits, all of which combined netted four runs. The result of this one inning was probably as much a surprise to Amherst as it was to Carolina's rooters.

Because of recent rains the diamond was in poor shape. In addition a high wind blew throughout the game and made fast fielding difficult. The game was not, however, without is thrillers. Amherst's entire infield, especially Parkenheimer and Burt, did classy work. Vernon pitched steadily and flelded well. The best play of the game came in the fourth, when with one on Hancs made a catch of Parkenheimer's drive, threw to first, and completed a fast double.
