N. C. Scientists Meet

The first session of the eleventh annual meeting of the North Carolina Academy of Science was held in the physics lecture room of the Alumni Building Friday afternoon at 2:30 P. M. the executive committee had a meeting, and at 3:00 P. M. the presentation of papers was begun.

The evening session was held at 8:00 P. M. in the lecture room at Chemistry Hall. The address of welcome to the Scientists on behalf of the University of North Carolina was delivered by President Francis P. Venable. Dr. H. V. Wilson, President of the Academy Science, then delivered his presidential address. It was a most interesting paper on "Zoology in America Before the Present Period". Professor A. H. Patterson, of the University, followed this with a Demonstration of Electric Waves. After this a number of papers were read and discussed.

ty of Pennsylvania since 1910; author of numerous books in chemistry; member of the National Academy of Science; distinguished for valuable contributions to scientific knowledge and for excellent educational service."

The honorary degree was next conferred on Dr. C. W. Stiles. Dean Raper said:

"Mr. President:

I have the honor to present for the degree of Dr. of Laws Charles Wardell Stiles: zoologist in the United States Public Health and Marine Hospital Service since 1902; scientific secretary of the Rockefeller Commission for the Eradication of Hook Worm Disease since 1909; author of numerous important scientific papers; distinguished by the vigor of his scientific work and by the intelligence and efficiency of his service for the sake of public health."

In presenting Dr. Lewis, Dean Raper said:

"Mr. President:

I have the honor to present the degrees of Doctor of Laws Richard Henry Lewis: secretary of the North Carolina Board of Health 1892-1909; president of the National Conference of State and Provincial Boards of Health of North America in 1906; president of the American Public Health Association in 1908; distinguished for a rare charm of personality, for excellence as a physician and teacher of medicine, and above all for a long and valuable service in the formation of public health."

The new building, named Caldwell Hall, in honor of the first president of the University, was authorized at the last session of the legislature. Work on the building was begun shortly after last commencement. The building is now practically finished and will be occupied by the Medical School at the beginning of next year. The building committee, composed of Dr. R. H. Lewis of Raleigh, chairman; Messrs. H. Weil of Goldsboro, V. S. Bryant of Durham, President F. P. Venable, and Dean I. H. Manning of the Medical Faculty, has spared no pains in their endeavor to make the building complete in every detail and adequate to meet the demands of modern medical education. The result is that the University of North Carolina has one of the most complete medical schools in the entire South.
