GOOD WISHES.

To a servant of the University abroad in search of his health the best wishes of the community go out. The presidency of any College is a wearing position and particularly so during periods of rapid expansion. The thirteen years which have seen Doctor Venable at the head of this institution have seen growth in every direction, healthy and encouraging. To his lot it has fallen to build, in large part, the present physical University, to set high standards for it, and to bring it to a position where it is able to serve the State directly and in an increasingly large way. By what struggles he has accomplished this work only he knows; and that he should feel the strain is no more than one could expect. His search for rest and the restoration of his health is but a preparation for the continuance of what to him is a labor of love. May he find the rest he seeks and return to carry the work forward.

THE ACTING PRESIDENT.

If there has been any person dissatisfied with the choice of Dean Graham as acting president, then he has kept quiet about it, or his solitary protest has been silenced by the chorus of joyful ones who hailed the nomination as wisdom from on high. Not only University men, but the people of the State generally, have expressed the greatest enthusiasm and confidence; and must be a source of infinite encouragement to Dean Graham. We know that he has, to a large extent, a united people behind him. That he will be closely watched during the year goes without saying. For a young man such a position is necessarily in the nature of a test, and the result will be of exceptional interest to the educational world and particularly to this student body. Therefore, gentlemen all, a splendid opportunity is extended to us. We have it in our power during this year to annoy or help, to make trouble or to banish trouble, to sit idle or to create an opportunity. We have absolute confidence in Dean Graham and our good wishes are his. But good actions are better than good wishes. We ourselves are put to the finest test of all, the test of friendship. Will we measure up to that test?

A CRITICAL YEAR.

In one sense every year is a critical year in that a new set of men comes to the headship of campus activities and it is always a question as to how well they will handle the work. But in more senses than one this one hundred and nineteenth session of the University is extremely important in the development of the institution. Last year saw the beginning of several movements which are capable of tremendous good to the University and to the State. This year will see whether those movements are put on a firm working basis so that their future is assured or whether they will fizzle away into nothing.

Acting President Graham has already spoken in chapel of the County clubs, an immense amount of raw material which is being moulded into useful tools. The men in the clubs began to realize the possibilities last year, but they have taken only one step on a long journey and unseen opportunities are lying just around the corner. There should be twice as many clubs and there should be twice as much enthusiasm in the old clubs. What was accomplished last year was greater than ever before, but is a drop in the bucket beside what might be accomplished in the future.

Another forward movement handed to us from last year is the Greater Council, that extension of the Student Council which kept its finger on the campus pulse and caught every worthy idea and turned it into something definite. Its possibilities have been barely tapped, and yet its fine record hints of a time when campus life will have been made more satisfying and when no student inspiration will be lost to the common good.

Out of the continual effort to give the University to the State arose the High School Debating Union and the High School Track meet. The track meet is but one phase of the movement to harness high school athletics in North Carolina and to show it the right direction. It is part of the new idea concerning University athletics that is seeking to make system out of chaos, and to make the people of the State realize that this is their University. This same idea finds its greatest expression in the Debating Union which for a one year old infant is about the healthiest on record. It is doubtful if any movement started here in Chapel Hill has met with such general approval throughout the State—and deservedly so. For it shows in a direct manner how useful the University may be to the whole State. It does not wait for the students to come to the University; it takes the University to the students. Its success last year was complete, but numerous extensions are now being planned that the Union may touch more schools than ever before. These opportunities are lying right before us and waiting for us to take hold and lift. The chance is an unusual one and for that reason all the more important. Pray God that we may rise to the occasion like men.
