### CLASS CONTESTS GROWING WARMER

Sophs Nose Out Victory Over Seniors. Juniors Haz Freshmen

BOTH GAMES WERE THE REAL STUFF

Seniors Followed Example of Varsity and Lost on Fumbles. Lewis Uncovers a Pretty Drop for the Sophs. "Shag" Plays a Good Field

The Sophomore football team took advantage of fumbles and defeated the husky Seniors on the class field by the score of 10 to 6.

Although the Seniors were able to make more first downs than their opponents, they fumbled frequently and thereby lost the game. The scoring started in the first quarter when a Senior back fumbled and Long of the Sophs recovered and ran for a touchdown. Goal was kicked, and the score stood Sophs. 7, Seniors 0.

The Seniors came back in the second quarter and on a series of line plunges took the ball over the Soph goal line for a touchdown. Seniors failed to kick goal. Seniors 6, Sophs. 7. There was no more scoring except in the fourth quarter when Mc. Lewis of the Sophomores made a pretty drop kick from the thirty-five yard line. The score ended Sophs. 10, Seniors 6.

#### ALUMNI REVIEW APPEARS

#### Has Articles of Interest to Student Body.

The Alumni Review for November showed up on schedule time. Besides the usual Alumni Notes, it has several other articles of interest, the most important from the standpoint of the campus being an explanation by the resident committee in regard to the cancellation of the A. & M. football game. This is the first official statement to be made. It is not a defence. It is a calm and fair exposition of the whole matter from the resumption of athletic relations with A. & M. last spring to the much-discussed cancellation of the game this fall, with the committee's reason for their action.

The principal other features of the Review are an outline of University Day and the addresses of President Graham, Dr. Henderson, and Secretary Daniels; a survey of the football season through the Washington and Lee game; and several interesting clippings from the press of the State in appreciation of the University.

Preliminaries to the Soph-Junior debate will be held Monday and Tuesday nights, November 24 and 25.

Over 100 high schools have entered the High School Debating Union. As soon as the list is complete it will be published.

A treat was afforded the University last night by Mr. Richard T. Wyche, who lectured in Gerard Hall on story-telling. Mr. White, who is now president of Story Tellers League of America, is an alumnus of the University. After his graduation some twenty years ago, he began teaching in Beaufort County. Abandoning the cut and dried methods of instruction, he taught his pupils by telling them stories. From this time on he has steadily risen until he is now ranked as one of the greatest story tellers in America.

After an appropriate introduction by Dr. Henderson, Mr. Wyche took up the subject of folklore in the South as depicted by Joel Chandler Harris. To illustrate his lecture he used the story of the tar baby and that of Brer Rabbit and the skeeters, in addition to two which he got from original sources. Mr. Wyche admirably described Harris as he saw him on two visits—a red haired, medium sized man of unconventional ways. Mr. Wyche gave an estimation of Harris, and showed that the Uncle Remus' stories will live because they are the expression of the accumulated emotion and imagination of two races, not inventions of one man's mind.

This is the first of a series of lectures, the remainder of which will be given in the spring.

#### Delivered by Rev. B. F. Huske of New Bern.

The second University sermon was delivered on Sunday by Rev. B. F. Huske '03 of Christ Church, New Bern. He chose his text from the fourteenth verse of the sixteenth chapter of St. John, where he read as follows: "He shall glorify me; for he shall receive of mine, and show it unto you." This, he said, was the essence of true greatness, was the operation of the Holy Ghost.

He conceived the Holy Spirit as rather an interpretative power acting between the Deity and humanity; and great men as men who most nearly conformed to the action of this power. He showed how this receiving inspiration from God, and distributing it to men, was the chief characteristic of the life of St. Paul and that this was the first principle of his greatness.

He compared great men and ordinary men to a reservoir and a stagnant pool. The great man received his inspiration from God and gave of it to his fellow men. He was the reservoir. The ordinary man, however, although he received the same inspiration did not give it out again. He was the stagnant pool.

This principle of greatness he applied to many vocations and in all it was applicable; the engineer, the preacher, the professional man, and the laborer alike must live a life of take and give to be their best in their chosen calling.

His final plea was that we pray not for easy lives or easy tasks, but for strength to overcome any and all obstacles which it may be our fate to meet. The true beauty and joy of life consists in applying strength from God to whatever vocation we may choose to follow.

The contract for the triangular debate between Hopkins, Virginia, and Carolina calls for the submission of a query by November 30th. ### CAROLINA DROWNS BAPTIST THIS TIME

Using Many Substitutes Tar Heels Easily Make the Score 29 to 0

ERVIN IS BACK IN THE GAME AGAIN

Taylor's End Runs, Ervin's Line Plunging, Burnett's Pass, Grimsley's Speed Features of the Game. Wake Forest Always on Defense.

For the second time this year Carolina has defeated Wake Forest, but what a difference!

The first game was played at Chapel Hill and was the initial game of the season, Carolina barely nosed out by one lone touchdown. Durham was the seat of the game Saturday, and the touchdowns were four. The scrubs were used almost half the game, altogether ten men were used in the backfield alone.

In contrast to the sluggish and loose play of the first game the team had plenty of pep, there was only one fumble, and the game was fast and aggressive. Ervin's fierce line plunging and Taylor's beautiful end runs were the features of the game. "Scipio" Burnett's received pass from Homewood for a touchdown from the 30 yard line was worth mention. Grimsley showed great speed in getting down under one of Foust's long punts and tackling the runner behind his own goal line. This produced two points in the form of a safety.

Carolina was on the aggressive the entire game with the exception of the last few minutes when some regular players had to be resubstituted to save the goal line as the Wake Forest bunch were sweeping down the field. In the first half Wake Forest did not run a single play. In the third quarter they ran four. Yet there was little difference in the weight of the two teams. On the other hand the Tar Heels were held for downs on several occasions and had to kick. Four attempted forward passes had a twenty-five per cent of efficiency.

Wake Forest received the ball but kicked at once. Carolina rushed the ball to the 5 yard line but lost it on downs. Wake Forest kicked but soon found the ball on their 3 yard line. It took three plays before Taylor carried it over a pass and a center rush having failed. Tandy did the proper stunt with his boot. That was all for the first quarter.

In the second Ervin and Taylor carried the ball over in about ten plays aided by a good run by Pope. Attempt at goal failed this time. They brought the ball back within striking distance and then the only successful pass of the game occurred. Burnett caught it in an open field and crossed. Tandy kicked after a kickoff by Foust.
