#### TRACK CAROLINA SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

## Contains Five Meets All Five of These on the Hill: With Southern Colleges

The Carolina track schedule has been announced by Manager Hackler. It consists of five meets two of which will take place in Chapel Hill. Carolina will open her season when she meets Clemson college early in April and will close it when she enters the S. I. A. A. meet, which will be held in Richmond about the first of May. The other two colleges that Carolina will meet are Washington & Lee and V. P. I., while the state meet will take place in Chapel Hill near the end of April.

The University track team has an unusual amount of good material this year. Among the men who won their letters either this year or last year are Captain Patterson, who runs the quarter mile; Smith, a 220-yard dash man Johnston, who runs the 100-yard dash; Homewood, a pole vaulter; Ramsay, a shot putter, and Wright, who broke the state broad jump record last year. Gannt, who did excellent work on the University of Virginia track team last year as a long distance runner, is at Carolina now and is expected to show up well in the spring. Little interest is shown in track activities on the Hill, because since Coach Statesville. Cartmell left two years ago there has been no regular track coach Hill. at the university.
