FACT AND COMMENT

Dr. W. deB. MacNider, Kenan Professor of Pharmacology in the University, has recently been appointed by the American Medical Association as a member of a committee on graduate training in Pharmacology. He has also received appointment as a member of the research committee of the National Anaesthesia Research Society.

Prof. W. W. Rankin, Jr., of the class of "12," formerly a professor of mathematics in the University, and now an instructor in mathematics in Columbia University, has accepted an offer to become professor of mathematics in Agnes Scott College at Decatur, Georgia.

Mr. J. V. Whitfield, formerly a professor of English in the University, has recently received appointment as U. S. Consul at Havana, Georgia.

Max D. Abernethy, of the class of "19," a well known newspaper man of Raleigh, was married on March 19th to Miss Elizabeth Hill, also of Raleigh.

Some time ago, Dr. A. S. Wheeler, of the department of chemistry, devised a thermometer for finding accurately and without correction the melting point or boiling point of organic compounds. It consists of a set of seven thermometers, each having a range of fifty degrees. A patent was taken out in Germany and a description is given in the new catalogue of Richter and Wilse, precision instrument makers of Berlin. Dr. Wheeler has just received word that Thomas and Co., of Philadelphia, will also make these thermometers and will describe them in their forthcoming catalogue. No patent will be applied for, however, in this country.

In a 20 page paper appearing in Psychobiology, a psychological magazine, entitled "Some Transfer Factors in Maze Learning by the White Rat," Dr. J. F. Dashiell, Professor of Educational Psychology in the University, discusses the question as to the effect of habits formed upon the acquisition of new habits. The article, which is based on experiments carried out in the psychological laboratory of Oberlin College, is illustrated with eleven figures and several tables.

Dr. H. W. Chase and Mr. C. T. Woolen attended a meeting of the Executive Committee of Trustees of the Universities in Raleigh last Wednesday.

Professors Peacock and Woosley, of the School of Commerce, were in Raleigh Saturday investigating the possibilities of securing certain laboratory materials for the School of Commerce.

During the summer of 1919 Professor Thorndike Saville, of the department of sanitary engineering, visited England and France on a Sheldon Traveling Fellowship in Engineering provided by Harvard University. As a result of his investigations he has recently published two reports in Public Work, under the titles "Notes on English Sewage Treatment and Water Work Notes in Europe."

A meeting of the N. C. Academy of Science will take place at Wake Forest College on April 29th and 30th. Dr. Archibald Henderson, head of the Department of Mathematics in the University, will read a paper on "The Lorentz Transformation in Einstein Relativity."

Dr. L. A. Williams, Professor of School Administration in the School of Education, has recently been notified by the Secretary of The American Association for the Advancement of Science that he has been elected a Fellow of the Association. The offices of the Association are located at the Smithsonian Institution, Washington.

During the Easter holidays Dr. L. A. Williams was in Roanoke Rapids, Virginia, making a survey of the public school system of that city.

Dr. D. D. Carroll, Dean of the School of Commerce, will leave for Lexington, N. C. Thursday to deliver an address before an audience of townspeople on the subject, "Education For Business." The address will be given under the auspices of the Lexington Chamber of Commerce which has selected a representative from the leading educational institutions of the State to deliver addresses at a general meeting of the townspeople at different dates this month. The subjects of the speakers have been left for them to choose, but it is expected they will be on matters of importance to city and community life. Dr. Carroll's address is the University number in the series.

Professor Noble delivered the commencement address at the Bynum Consolidated School of Chatham County during the holidays.

Dr. E. W. Knight delivered the commencement address at The Mantoo High School Saturday, April 2nd.

Dr. Dashiell attended the meeting of the Southern Society of Philosophy and Psychology at Macon, Ga., during the Easter vacation. At this meeting he read a paper based on some work done by certain students in the class in experimental Psychology.

Dr. E. C. Branson returned Wednesday, March 30, from Washington, D. C., where he attended the Conference of the American County Life Association, and the Conference of twenty-one National Social Agencies.

Mr. S. H. Hobbs, Jr., of the Department of Rural Economics, delivered the commencement address at the Iolita High School of Macon County, March 25th.

W. E. Blake of the class of '23, spent a few days on the Hill last week. He was a special student last year and is not in college this year.

The editor spent a few days this week visiting relatives in South Carolina. We have never appreciated our own Piedmont section more than now, after visiting a one crop section. Cotton is the chief product raised in the section we visited and cotton farmers are in a very serious condition. The price has fallen so low that it does not pay to raise it, and yet many farmers feel that they cannot raise anything else.
