Boudigny and Co., contracting engineers of Charlotte, who will be placed on the installation of a 6000 volt sub-station at Lexington, N. C.; R. A. Thompson will alternate with H. W. Butts on a job with the Walker Electric Co., of Atlanta, in the installation of electrical and mechanical equipment of the Riverside and Dan River Cotton Mills at Danville, Va.

Near the end of the first half Griffin carried the ball well into South Carolina's territory. Just before the whistle blew he intercepted a pass and in two plays carried the ball over the goal line.

During the second half line plays were generally unsuccessful, so the punting duel was renewed. Finally South Carolina made a series of first downs which carried the ball over North Carolina's goal line. South Carolina's defensive system proved to make line plays and end runs very difficult for the Tar Heels. On the offensive Boatwright made considerable gains for his team through running back the punts which he received. For North Carolina Griffin starred in the backfield and Robinson's work at center was also noteworthy.
