JOE BALDWIN

SIXTEEN CLASSES BEING CONDUCTED

Extension Division Is Now Operating Classes Throughout the State

The University Extension Division is now operating sixteen extension classes throughout the State taught by regular members of the faculty. Three hundred and eighty-one students are enrolled. Classes are held in the following cities: Raleigh, Oxford, Sanford, Greensboro, High Point, Lexington, Reidsville, Durham, Salisbury, Concord, Gastonia, and Shelby.

A minimum of fifteen students are required before a class is organized. Each class meets once a week, or twice a week, and lasts sixteen weeks. When all University requirements are met, credit for extension classes is given the same as for residence work.

Commenting upon this and related phases of the University's Extension activity, the Durham HERALD speaks as follows:

"Hundreds of men and women in all walks of life throughout the State are today using the services of the University for better fitting themselves for their chosen work. A whole book could be written telling of the service the University is rendering the people of the State outside of its regular academic instruction.

"Those things, as we see it, make the University something more than an educational institution where boys and girls may earn a B. A., M. A., or some other of the customary degrees conferred by universities and colleges. If it didn't confer a single degree, but carried on the great work it is now doing out in the State, it would more than justify its existence and cost to the people."

Prof. E. G. Hoefler, Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering, and Mr. Carter, of the Atwood Organization, attended the organization meeting of the Raleigh branch of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers last week. About fifteen were present at the meeting.

The Raleigh branch of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers is a part of the Carolina section. The other branches are at Charlotte and Greenville, S. C.

TOURNAMENT OF CHESS-CHECKER FIENDS THURSDAY

Chapel Hill Chess and Checker Club to Conduct Annual Meeting Here Today

MANY CONTESTANTS DUE

The Chapel Hill Chess and Checker Club has succeeded in bringing the annual Thanksgiving meeting of the North Carolina Chess and Checker Association to "The Hill" this year. Heretofore, the Association has confined its attention solely to checkers. Every year a State Champion has been determined for this game. But at present, there is no champion of North Carolina for chess.

It will be of interest to all lovers of chess to learn that the winner of the Chapel Hill Invitation Tournament will be declared State Champion. It is to be regretted, however, that owing to the necessity of getting permission from the State Association to hold the tournament, this notice is so late in going to the press. Chapel Hill will furnish at least twenty-five chess players; six or eight will come from Durham; Raleigh is expected to send a delegation; and there will be other players from various parts of the State. It is possible that there are many excellent players in the State who will not be able to come. The privilege will be given to these men to challenge the winner of the tournament, or it is possible that another tournament will be held during the winter.

While the chess tournament will be the big drawing card, nevertheless, the checker tournament is not without interest. The winner of this tournament will be allowed to challenge the present State Champion. At the tournament held in Charlotte last July, one of the local players, Edward Scheidt, made the highest score but lost in the

finals, two to one and three draws. Any one who defeats him at this time will have to display an exceedingly fine game.

With Dr. Royster, Dr. Caldwell, Dr. Henry, Dr. Lasley, and other strong players representing the Club in chess, it is hoped that the first State Champion in chess will come from Chapel Hill. Dr. Royster was at one time champion of Texas. It was his good fortune to win every tournament at the University of Chicago in which he participated. He is also picked to win this tournament.

The tournament will be held in the Social Rooms of the Presbyterian Church. The preliminaries will be held from 9:30 a. m. till 2:00 p. m. The finals will be held as soon after the Carolina-Virginia game as is possible. Any one at all interested in the tournament should communicate with Dr. W. E. Caldwell, President of the Chapel Hill Chess and Checker Club, immediately.

Mail delivery in the town is now in good working order and delivery is being made to all houses that have numbers now. Delivery will begin in the dormitories just as soon as the boxes can be obtained and installed.
