GEOLOGY CLUB HEARS INTERESTING PAPERS

Clark and Miller Discuss Important Geological Factors-Prouty Will Be Speaker at Next Meeting.

Two important papers of much scientific interest were read at the meeting of the Geology Club in No. I New East building last Saturday morning at 8:30. C. Miller spoke on the subject of "The Uses of the Silverman Illuminator in the Study of Opaque Minerals in Polished Sections." Ivan Clark discussed the "Geographic Divisions of Michigan."

Mr. Miller pointed out the advantages of oblique light given by the illuminator over the old vertical types. These advantages are: (1) observation of the true color of the minerals, (2) differsit entiation of the gangue minerals strom the ore minerals, (3) disclosure of cleavage, etching, internal structure and the eau to find employment of some sort presence of minerals below the surface of the section, (4) indication of the relative hardness of the mineral by the re-lief emphasized by the oblique light, (5) illumination of cavaties, (6) observation of micro-chemical reactions. The possibilities of the use of the illuminator in the study of sediments, soil minerals, and clay minerals, and, also number of men who apply promptly. its use with polarized light in the study
