

tradition that it was brought against the University of North Carolina at her the University's stand on the Poole bill.

"It is a significant fact that the charge is not supported by specific instances of men who have lost their faith or turned into atheists or infidels on account of University training.

"To charge the students with bringing the characteristics of atheists and infidels to the University campus is to charge half the homes of North Carolina with turning out atheists and infidels. Sixty per cent of the faculty comes from North Carolina homes; many of the others come from religious institutions: to my knowledge no student has ever accused any one of them of making an atheist or an infidel out of him; and certainly no member of the University faculty has ever been convicted of undermining Christian faith."
