

COATES DEFENDS THE UNIVERSITY

tradition that it was brought against the University of North Carolina at her birth, that it has continued with varying degrees throughout her history, and that it has been revived in recent days by the University's stand on the Poole bill.

"It is a significant fact that the charge is not supported by specific instances of men who have lost their faith or turned into atheists or infidels on account of University training.

"To charge the students with bringing the characteristics of atheists and infidels to the University campus is to charge half the homes of North Carolina with turning out atheists and infidels. Sixty per cent of the faculty comes from North Carolina homes; many of the others come from religious institutions; to my knowledge no student has ever accused any one of them of making an atheist or an infidel out of him; and certainly no member of the University faculty has ever been convicted of undermining Christian faith."

There are 15 new registrations in the graduate school. This brings the total for the fall and winter quarters up to about 165.

Group Meetings Friday

There will be group meeting on Friday. The local association officers will meet in Gerrard hall at 9 o'clock. The discussion will be led by R. D. W. Other group meetings at the same hour will be: Class officers, with discussion led by W. S. Bernard, chairman of the Alumni Review, with discussion led by Robert W. There will be a general assembly of the different groups in Gerrard hall at 11 o'clock with President Stacy presiding to hear reports from the group meetings and for transaction of other business. There will follow a buffet luncheon at the Carolina Inn, with University faculty members as guests.

To Meet Faculty
