A serving closet and a ladies apartment are in the rear of the reception room. From the serving closet a stairway leads down into the basement to a kitchen. On the second floor of the larger tower is the chapter hall, where acted. From the third floor or tower room the deck can be reached by climbing the winding stairway of the smaller tower.

Throughout the castle hang pewter candlesticks, each holding a small electric bulb. All of the rooms are fitted with baseplugs which can later be used for table lamps or cleaners. In the basement is an air circulation heating plant that heats the first floor of the building. All of the hardware is hand-forged, and is practically the same style as that used in the England of Saxon times.

Piney Prospect

Famous for the castle that crowns its brink and abounding in strange tales, also, is Piney Prospect.
