Carolina won a place in the sun of national athletics when the Tar Heel relay team won the four mile relay championship of America in the Penn feature events of the Carnival.



Elliott took the baton about 60 yards ahead and although Bill Cox, Penn State intercollegiate mile champion, forced the pace throughout, Elliott forged ahead and added 40 yards to the leead.

This was a great race, and as a re ward for their great running the Tar Heels were given a silver loving cup, a bronze plaque, and individual gold watches.


After one more week in the south, Kay Kyser and his Orchestra will leave for Cleveland, Ohio, where they will be located until September.
