

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

240 Students on N.C.C.W. Honor Roll

Greensboro, February 27 .---North Carolina College counts 240 students on the honor roll because of excellent work in the first semester, according to statistics just secured from the office of Miss Mary Taylor Moore, registrar. The number on the roll represents about 16 per cent of the student body, which last semester was made up of 1,734 women.

All students whose average for the semester was a grade of B were put in the honor-class. Many of the 240 made no grade lower than B. Eleven of the number made no grade lower than A. Nine seniors whose names are on the list have been on the honor roll since they entered the college in 1927.
