FURTHER PAVING FOR THE STREETS CHAPEL HILL

Tarvia Process to Be Completed Soon for Pittsboro and Rosemary Streets; Preliminaries Finished.

FRANKLIN TO BE WIDENED

Between the work of the CWA and that of the PWA, Chapel is soon to present an almost unbroken layout of hardsurfaced streets.

With the aid of funds from the government administered through the CWA, Pittsboro street, four blocks on Rosemary street, and several streets between Rosemary and Franklin are now being treated with Tarvia.

The final coating of rock has been placed on the greater part of the area to be covered on Rosemary, and the final section should be completed within a week; the state of the weather will determine that. Preliminary operations have been finished.

To Widen Franklin

The widening of the concrete surface of Franklin street from the President's house to the city limits on Strowd hill has been announced as a part of the spring schedule of the state highway commission. The road will be concrete from curb to curb.


