Concluding a three day visit to the University, James Stephens, Irish poet, novelist, and Physics" Saturday morning. critic, will lecture in Gerrard hall at 8:30 o'clock tonight on "The Irish Renaissance."

Stephens appeared in Graham Memorial Sunday afternoon, where he read selections from his literary works.

"The Irish Renaissance" strictly a subject within Stephens' field, for the poet is at about his native land, since it was only recently that the writer left Ireland for his source material.
