The courts will be completed or the spring quarter and the complaint of congestion will be orever stiled. The entire tenis colony is divided into three sections; south, middle and north.
The southern section will have 13 asphalt and 6 clay playing surfaces. The middle will be composed of 6 asphalt, 2 concrete and 6 clay courts, most of these having been in use last quarter. The remaining northern division will be solely asphalt courts, 10 in all.
These 43 courts will be a great aid to the future tennis stars that were hampered by the lack of courts in their quest for fame.
