Coach Howard G. Cann was perhaps the greatest all-around athlete in New York University history. While Cann showed to great advantage in basketball he was also a prominent member of the football and track teams as an undergraduate. In 1917 he was captain of the basketball team and in 1919 leader of the football eleven. He starred as a forward on the Violet court team and stood out with equal brilliance both as a tackle and as a fullback on the gridiron. He was one of the leading kickers in the east and won country-wide recognition for his ability in basketball and track.

Besides being coach of basketball Mr. Cann is director of physical training with the rank of work in the University College record of the Violet quintet of Arts and Pure Science and has supervision over the gymnasium at University Heights.

In these latter capacities Coach Cann succeeded his father, the late Mr. Frank H. Cann, who served on the staff of the University for over 37 years. Mr. Cann, Sr., was named director-emeritus of the gymnasium upon his retirement from the faculty in March of 1932.

Coach Cann served as head football coach at N. Y. U. in 1932 and 1933. He resigned on February 1, 1934 and was succeeded by Dr. Marvin A. Stevens, the present coach.


