WINNERS RUN UP EASY VICTORIES IN MURAL RACE

Aycock, Old West No. 2, and Mangum No. 1. Sweep to Victories with High Scores

FIVE CONTESTS FOR TODAY

Play in the intramural basketball race was comparatively slack yesterday afternoon as Aycock, Old West No. 2, and Mangum No. 1 swept through to victories over their respective opponents in the only games played.

Mangum No. 1 met its first severe test when they met the Ranson house quintet and succeeded in winning out after a hectic struggle 25-12.

Mangum, defending campus champs, had scored over 50 points in both of their previous games but were held to 25 markers by a fighting Ranson house five. Play was close throughout the entire contest with neither team getting far ahead of the other.

Franklin Loses

Completely outplaying and outscoring a weaker "Franklin Five," Aycock opened up and added a 44-11 victory to their string. Aycock allowed the "Franklin Five" but 11 points as they rolled up score after score to completely bewilder their opponents.

Drubbing

In the final game of the day Old West No. 2 basketballers handed the Ruffin No. 2 squad a severe drubbing as they came off on the long end of a 60-10 count. Leading 22-8 at the half, Old West came back for the second period with both their offense and defense clicking smoothly as they limited Ruffin to a lone field goal while garnering an additional 38 markers for themselves.

Barium Springs and Durham will Defend Mat and Ring Titles Here

With both defending champions showing plenty of strength in dual competition, the North Carolina high school wrestling and boxing circles are busy in preparation for the sixth annual interscholastic tournaments to be held here February 10-11.

Plenty of interest in being displayed in both sports. Teams which entered last year's highly successful tourneys are expected to send entries this season.

Barium Springs and Raleigh, defending champions in wrestling and boxing, respectively, have displayed great power in winning dual meets so far this season.

Wrestling Trophy

Barium Springs and Durham each have two legs on the wrestling trophy. It is necessary to win the title three times in order to gain permanent possession of the cup.

Raleigh won the boxing cup last winter. A new trophy will be offered this winter. Raleigh's victories came in 1931, 1934, and 1935. Wilson and Charlotte each had one leg on the old cup.

Important announcements concerning the tournaments were made recently by E. R. Rankin, secretary of the North Carolina High School Athletic association. Contestants will weigh in at Emerson stadium here at 10 a. m. Monday, February 10.

Competition will open at 2:30 p. m., February 10, with the preliminaries in both sports being held. The semi-finals in both tournaments will be conducted at 8 p. m., February 10.

LOSS OF FISHER WEAKENS BOXERS

Carolina May Have to Forfeit Welter Scrap to State in First Big Five Clash

Joe Fisher, regular monogram welterweight, will be lost to the North Carolina varsity boxers Saturday night when they take the ring against the vastly improved N. C. State team in Raleigh.

The meet will be the initial Big Five clash of the current season. Both varsity and freshman teams meet.

With Fisher on the sidelines nursing a severe eye injury sustained in the Virginia match last week, Coach Crayton Rowe is left without a welterweight. Carolina may be forced to forfeit this division although several men, now trying out for heavier weights, will be given a chance at the berth.

May Forfeit Welter

Should Carolina not be able to place a man in the ring for this weight, State's only undefeated boxer, Seamon Hudson, will automatically continue his perfect campaign. Boxing fans had looked forward to the bout between Hudson and Fisher, which was scheduled as one of the feature bouts of the night's program.

There will be several colorful bouts on the varsity schedule. In the featherweight, Bazemore of State will meet Joe Murnick, who has taken Captain Ernie Eutsler's place in the latter's sickness. Bazemore received much praise for his fine performance against Clemson last week.

Shores Meets Penland

Penland of State meets Bill Shores in the lightweight. The Tar Heel lost his first varsity fight last week, gaining the first two of the season by T. K. O.'s in the first round. Other leading members of the strong Wolfpack club are Powell, middleweight, and Johnson, heavyweight.

Two Carolina boxers will risk undefeated records. They are Marion Diehl, bantamweight, and Jules Medynski, junior middleweight. Diehl has a draw on his record while the latter has three clean-cut victories.

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COACH PICKS MEN TO RUN SATURDAY

Ranson Names Five Tar Heel Trackmen to Participate in Millrose Event

Five Tar Heel runners will compete in the seventh annual Millrose A. A. track and field games in New York City Saturday. Harry Williamson will participate in the 1000-yd. run while the Carolina relay team will enter the two-mile relay.

Coach Dale Ranson announced yesterday that Williamson would be accompanied by Graham Gammon, Co-Captain "Red" Drake, Bob Gardiner, and Roy Rosser, who will make up the Carolina relay entry. The baton carriers will run against such formidable opposition as Columbia, Yale, and Boston College.

Gammon May Anchor

If it is possible for Williamson to run the relay after he competes in the 1000-yd. run, he will supplant Rosser, and run at the anchor post. Should Williamson be unable to compete in the relay, Graham Gammon will take the anchor position.

The Millrose games will be the Tar Heel quartette's initial race of the season, although Williamson competed in the Boston K. of C. games last week.

Big Event

The Millrose games are one of the most prominent indoor track events held in Madison Square Garden during the winter season. Last season the games attracted 16,000 people, and as this year's field includes 21 national champions, from A. A. U. and I. C. A. circles, a record crowd is expected.

DUKE TANKMEN TO MEET VIRGINIA TEAM SATURDAY

University, Va., Jan. 29.—Virginia's varsity swimmers, who opened their season last Saturday by defeating the Richmond Y. M. C. A. 55 to 28, have a tough meet just ahead against Duke University in Durham Saturday night.

Last year the Cavaliers nosed out ahead of the Blue Devils in their meeting here but this year's Virginia tank team is not quite as strong as the one captained by Charlie Prince, who is now coaching the University boys in their water sports.

Coach Skidmore Still Uncertain About Starting Line-Up for South Carolina Game

MULLIS LEADS IN SCORING

Coach Walter Skidmore sent his varsity cagemen through a lengthy drill yesterday afternoon in preparation for the game Saturday night with South Carolina in Columbia.

A considerable part of the practice was spent in attempting to smooth out rough spots and in trying to keep the play of the team as a whole more consistent. One of the chief faults of the White Phantoms this year has been unsteadiness.

Captain Jim McCachren, who is fast regaining his old form, vaulted into second place in scoring as a result of Tuesday night's game with V. P. I. McCachren rang up 14 points to run his total to 73, five points behind Pete Mullis, who leads with 78. Andy Bershak has 71, Paul Kaveny 70, Mel Nelson 69, Earl Ruth 41, Ramsay Potts 31, Latcher Webster 21 and Foy Grubb 2.

Lead State Race

The Tar Heels are leading the State basketball race without a loss, but have dropped two conference games and one inter-sectional contest. W. & L. and Virginia hold conference victories and New York University holds the other.

Carolina's lead in state competition will be seriously threatened next Thursday night when the Phantoms face the mighty Duke five in the Tin Can. Previous to the Duke game Wake Forest is met there Tuesday night. The week is finished up when Navy invades Chapel Hill to battle the Tar Heels Saturday night.

Tar Heels One Up

Just what lineup Coach Skidmore is planning to use against the Gamecocks is uncertain. No great difficulty is anticipated with South Carolina, over whom the Tar Heels already hold an easy victory.
