Athletic Passbooks—May be obtained at cashier's office until Saturday. Students must have them to see Spring sports events.

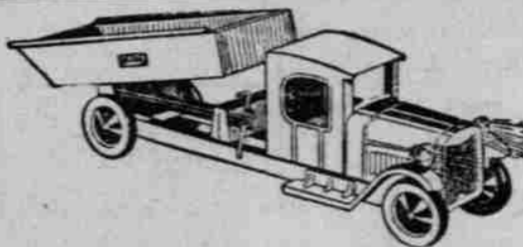
