Bennett promised last night that numerous prominent students and faculty members would be available as targets in the egg-throwing contests. "Three throws at 30 paces for a dime,—rotten eggs extra," said Bennett.

Freddy Johnson's band will furnish music for the street dance to be held between the upper and lower quadrangles. The street itself will be waxed and prepared for dancing.

When the throng moves on to the upper quadrangle, Henry Bryant and Earl Connell will have prepared set-ups for various athletic games including bowling, miniature golf, and ping-pong.

To help the student body get a clear idea of the whole afternoon celebration, the procedure from the lower quadrangle up to Davie Poplar will be shown in a graph, which will be published later this week.

SPANISH PRIESTS SUBJECT OF BOOK

J. Fred Rippey and Jean Thomas Nelson Release New Book

The University of North Carolina Press announced yesterday the release of Professor J. Fred Rippey and Jean Thomas Nelson's "The Crusaders of the Jungle."

The book deals with the Spanish padres sent by the Spanish kings to "conquer the legions of Satan in the New World beyond the Ocean Sea." An excerpt from the jacket of the new book gives a hint of its contents: "In South America the padres found no El Dorado, no fabled cities of gold, but only tribes of naked savages living in a 'Green Hell'... The Guarani Indians of Paraguay named their children in a repulsive ceremony at which both parents and children partook of a soup made from the flesh of a prisoner of war... Indians of Maranon ate such of their relatives as died of sickness... The Mojoes often buried their children alive to avoid the burden of rearing them... And the Jibaros decapitated their enemies and shrank their skulls to drive out the soul."

The book is illustrated by Wilis Physioc.

In Washington this week are Governor Ehringhaus and Attorney-General Seawell talking over the possibility of unemployment insurance legislation in North Carolina with John G. Winant.

Ehringhaus is said to be considering an extra session of the legislature to pass a social security participation law enabling unemployed to receive a minimum of \$30 per month.

This action indicates what J. C. B. may intend to leave as his "governor's heritage" to the State. Tradition inclines each North Carolina governor to leave some major governmental product to the people as a sort of memorial to himself. O. Max Gardner left us consolidation.
