Resting on Sunday (travelling only about 300 miles) the squad continues against Amherst on Monday and then plays in rapid-fire order Yale, Army, N. Y. U., Princeton and Navy. The Tar Heels will totter back on May 10 after a week of competition that would test any team in the nation.

Interest will be focused on the Princeton match. The Tigers have ruined the past two seasons with 9-0 and 7-2 defeats. On Saturday they squelched N. Y. U. 9-0.

6. The student's list of books collected while he has been at college shall be submitted to the committee by May 1.

7. Other indications of genuine interest and enthusiasm shown in the choice of subject matter will be discovered during the candidate's interview with the judges in their effort to select the library of the greatest interest, collected and used with the highest intelligence.

8. Following the first elimination, the judges may arrange for a public exhibition of those entries selected for the final competition.

Carolina's golf team will encounter for the second time this season the Davidson club on the Hope Valley course at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

At the previous meeting the Tar Heels took the measure of the Wildcats by a 13 to 5 count. Following the Davidson match the team will play Wake Forest in Raleigh and then Friday the State Championship will be played on the same course.

Duke is the favorite to take the championship in Raleigh. If an upset is scored, however, it will be the boys from Chapel Hill who will do it.

The team returned from the Southern Intercollegiate Open Tourney Sunday where they lost their team title to L. S. U. Captain Dick Harris, Dupont Kirven, Horace Hamilton, Dick Hicks, and Ben Wyche made the trip. Hamilton won the second round defeating Buster Fahy of Georgia after defeating his team-mate Dick Hicks in the semi-finals.

Tar Heel Tennis Team to Try  
For Seventh Straight White-  
wash; Records Back Hopes

TO HEAD NORTH SOON

With the state championships an event of the past, the varsity netters gather their racquets this afternoon and troop over to Duke University for their ninth dual meet of the season.

Undefeated and unthreatened, the varsity enters this match a heavy favorite over the the Blue Devils. Comparative scores substantiate this in relation to Amherst. Carolina scored a 9-0 win over the Massachusetts team, whereas Duke was humbled by an 8-1 count.

Henderson on Top

Archie Henderson, newly crowned state champion, will make his debut this afternoon as number one man for the Tar Heels. He will be followed by Eddy De Gray, state runner-up, Ramsay Potts, Eddy Fuller, Frank Shore and Johnny Foreman in that order.

The Duke squad will probably be led by Ashby. This Duke player was seeded third in the state tourney, but was eliminated in an early round by Johnny Foreman.

Dave Caton, second for the Blue Devils, was also upset by a Tar Heel, bowing to Co-captain Frank Shore.

Record

Of the eight matches to date, six whitewash victories have already been transferred to the victory bag. Today's match with Duke marks the final appearance of the varsity in this state for some time. After competing on Wednesday in the Duke mass meet, the netters will rest until Friday when they leave on their northern trip.

This feature of the tennis season comprises an extended eight day tour of the New England states.
