Orchestra Leader Will Bring Band Here for Thursday Night Dance of Set

Joe Haymes and his orchestra have been signed to open the German Club set of Finals here Thursday night, June 4, it was announced last night by officials of that organization.

The announcement came as somewhat of a surprise since it has been the policy recently to open the Finals set with a band of less note and especially since Ray Noble had already been signed to play for the last two days.

Reputation Haymes has the reputation of being one of the best arrangers and composers of modern dance music. Haymes played piano in Ted Weem's band when that orchestra was at the height of its popularity but has been directing his own musical units for the last five years.

He has a hobby of developing good orchestras and then selling them to other leaders. It is reported that he sold Buddy Rogers and Tommy Dorsey their bands and that Ray Noble also obtained half his men from Hay-
