The Institute will be held here in the spring of 1937. It will be the fourth since the one in 1927, when it was started by the Y. M. C. A. Heretofore the Institute has been held every four years, but at the 1935 conference, it was decided that the next one should be held in 1937. At that time, it will be determined whether the following one will be held in two years or four. Active



TRUSTEE HEARING

Some Think It Would Be III Taste to Ask That Faculty Members Appear

COMMITTEE IS APPOINTED

Members of the local faculty of the Greater University of North Carolina, meeting yesterday afternoon, voted decisively not to ask to be heard by the Board of Trustees at their meeting in Greensboro Saturday when the question of consolidation of engineering education is to be reopened.

The vote was taken at the end of a discussion lasting little over an hour, during which many professors insisted it would be ill taste to suggest to the trustees that faculty members be invited to appear before the Greensboro meeting.

Committee

The faculty voted unanimously, however, for a recommendation offered by Dr. H. M. Wagstaff to the effect that a committee of five professors be named and be ready to appear before the board Saturday to explain what they consider the majority view of the faculty should the trustees ask for faculty representation.

Dr. Wagstaff's recommendation was embodied in a resolution offered by Dr. J. B. Bullitt which was adopted by a decisive majority and which read as follows: "Inasmuch as the University faculty recently has approved the transmission of certain resolutions concerning the school of engineering to our Board of Trustees; and inasmuch as the Board of Trustees may desire some personal representation from this faculty to explain and elaborate those resolutions, be it resolved that we select a committee who will be prepared to appear before the board should the board desire (Continued on last page)
