### Dr. H. K. Beale, Sandy McCleod, Harvard Instructor Motor Over Europe

After spending 12 weeks observing the political and economic situation in Europe, Dr. H. K. Beale, professor of history, has returned to Chapel Hill feeling that America still has a chance to keep from choosing between communism and fascism.

"We still have a chance to clean house on a democratic method, but we must do it pretty quick or face the same choice that European countries are forced to make today," declared Dr. Beale.

The history professor said that practically every country on the continent is expecting war and is afraid that when international war does start, bitter civil wars will necessarily follow in each country.

### Visits France

Dr. Beale, Sandy McCleod, graduate student at the University, and an instructor of history at Harvard made the trip together, motoring through Europe. The party visited France just after the nation-wide strikes ended, and reported that they felt the Blum government has done admirable things for France. However, Beale said that it was a matter of time as to how long the Popular Front government could hold together, since there is a powerful nationalist movement arising.

At Geneva, Switzerland, Dr. Beale gave the opening night lecture at the Alfred Zimmern school of international studies on "Freedom in American Schools." The professor said that German Switzerland seems to be very antagonistic toward the Nazis and is in terror of attack from Germany or Italy.

### German Attitude

The party arrived in Austria on the anniversary of the death of Chancellor Dolfuss, and saw a tremendous celebration in his memory. In Germany where he spent two weeks, Dr. Beale was impressed by what he called an extraordinary amount of repression of citizens because of their political views, and of the front the Germans put up for foreigners. He said that elaborate instructions were given the German people as to how to treat tourists visiting the country for the Olympics. "Because of this repression of information," he

### New Coed Enrollment Will Not Be Greater Than Last Session

### Petitions to Trustees for Under- graduate Admittance Futile

Approximately the same number of women students will attend the University this year as did during the 1935-36 session.

Highest coed enrollment last year was 289, and Mrs. Marvin Stacy, advisor to women, estimated that final enrollment figures this fall will be close to that.

Save for the few women pharmacy students Carolina's coed enrollment is entirely in the junior and senior classes, as a result of the regulation begun a year ago that not even women of Chapel Hill and environs should be admitted as freshmen or sophomores.

Petitions protesting the University's board of trustee exclusion of underclass coeds were considered by the board in its meeting last June. It voted decisively to continue the exclusion policy.

### Rushing Hours Also Altered

Fraternity rushing time for this fall was shortened two days by a vote of the Interfraternity council last night.

Viewing the plans for a special train of 500 students to go to the Carolina-New York University football game in New York City on October 17, the council decided to end rushing at 11 p. m. October 15, instead of October 17, as originally planned.

The council's plans will not be official until sanctioned by its faculty advisory committee. Questioned last night, however, Dr. J. C. Lyons, faculty committeeman, stated that faculty approval was most certain.

### Pledge Date

Following last night's meeting, Henry Clark, president of the council, announced that it was planned for freshmen to be pledged at 2 p. m. October 16. The special train to New York will leave that night.

Previously announced plans for rushing hours during week days and weekends were altered slightly under the council's new plans.

The following hours will be observed, if the council's new plans are approved:

Bids will be distributed October 3. Announcement will be made later as to the hours bids will be distributed in dormitories.

Rushing on October 4, Sunday, will be between 2 and 6 p. m. and 7 and 11 p. m.

From October 5 through 8, hours will be 7-10 p. m.

Hours for October 9 and 10 will be 7-11 p. m.

From October 11, the second Sunday, through October 14, hours will be 7-9 p. m.

Hours for Thursday, October 15, the last night, will be 7-11 p. m.
