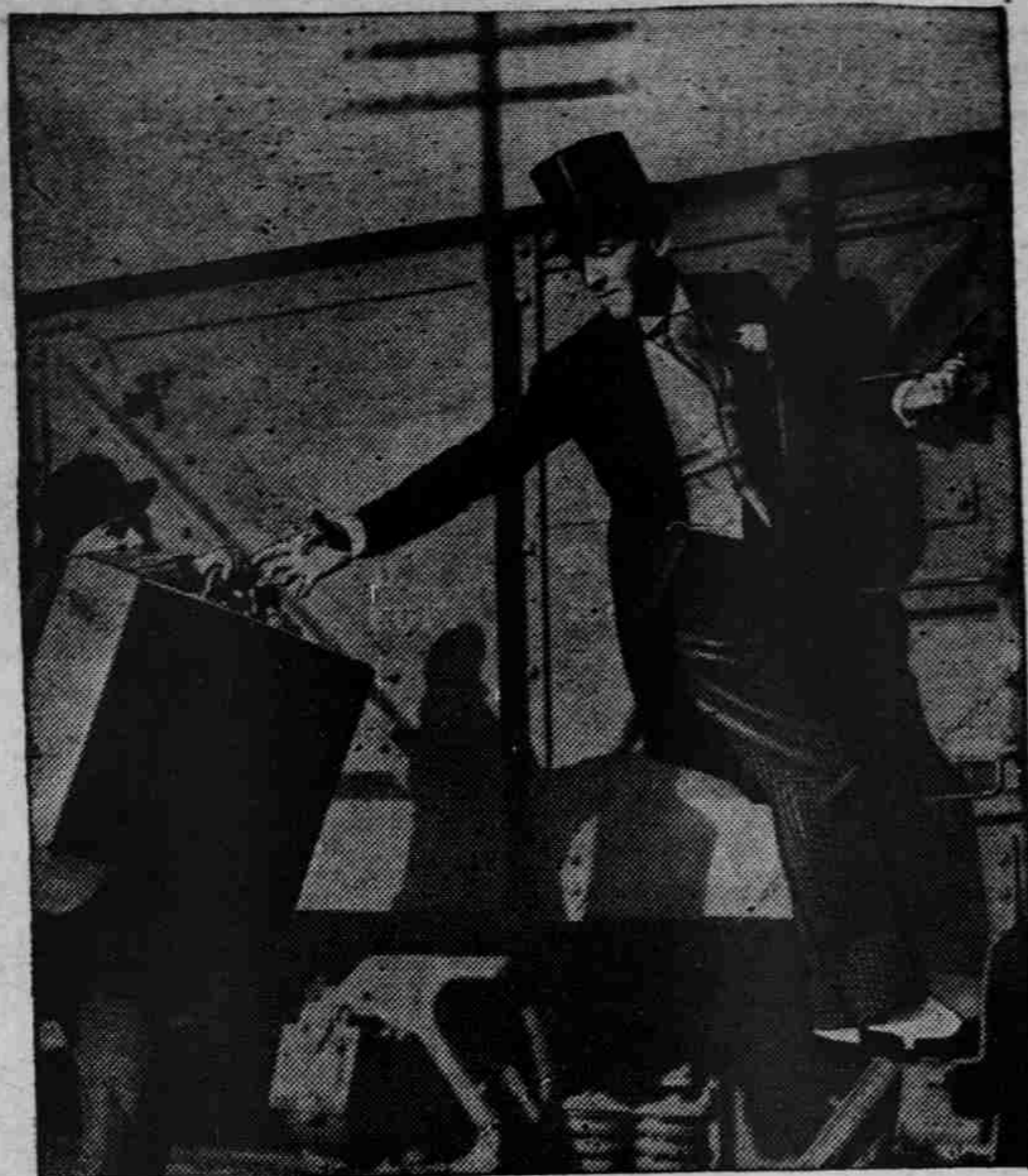

**Hudson Gives Talk On Humor Of South**

Professor Addresses Audience in Bull's Head Bookshop

Reading and discussing various passages from his anthology of regional humor, "Humor in the Old Deep South," Dr. A. P. Hudson of the English department of the University, spoke yesterday afternoon in the Bull's Head bookshop to an audience of some 75 persons.

Dr. Hudson is a professor of English at the University but is a native Mississippian, spending all of the first 35 years of his life in the regions to which his book relates. He received his M.A. degree from the University of Chicago and his Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina.

Dr. Hudson's talk was preceded by a tea served in the Bull's Head tea room.
