Mauter Finishes Second; Delta Psi Winning Team

Mauter Sets Fast Pace; Zink Takes Lead At Half-Way Lewis Runner Up

Putting on one of the closest finishes seen in a long while, George Zink staved off a last minute attack by Bill Mauter to take first place in the 13th annual intramural Cake race and establish a new course record of 9:42.1.

Entering the track, Zink had about a 25-yard lead on Mauter, but the latter began to close the gap. Going into the last turn on the track, it looked like Mauter was going to pass, but Zink had that little extra in reserve and crossed the finish line a winner.

For this weekend the Blue Devils of Coach Wallace Wade and Duke university make the 10-mile trip to Kenan stadium to face the Tar Heels of Coach Ray Wolf and the University of North Carolina. For the past two years they have drawn capacity and record crowds. This year is no exception.
