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## University Fiscal Records Not Audited In Five Years

### Internal Check System Forestalls Danger, Says Rogerson

### Pou Makes Request

L. B. Rogerson, assistant controller of the University, last night confirmed the report that the fiscal records of the University have not been audited for five years.

"However," cautioned Rogerson, "because of an adequate system of internal check, there is no danger resulting from the lack of audit."

University records are audited by the state auditor. An inadequate staff of the state audit bureau has been, officials say, the chief reason of neglect of the University's books.

### Simple Check

Rogerson stated that "there has been an office audit in Raleigh of the books we send to the state auditor." He explained that such an audit consisted of a simple check on invoices and checks.

The present check-system on handlers of University funds, said Rogerson, "prevents any one person from originating and completing the same transaction."

### Requests

During the past five years the University has made several requests for audits, although state audit officials have reported themselves unable to comply.

George Ross Pou, present state auditor, has requested a larger budget from the present legislature. Mr. Rogerson feels that a larger staff, made possible through a larger budget, will enable more frequent University audits.

Before it was discontinued in 1932, the annual audit of University books required the work of three state auditors for approximately two months.

## New 'Who's Who' Lists 55 Persons From Chapel Hill

### Dr. Susan Akers, Library Science Head, Only Chapel Hill Woman in 1936-37 Edition

The new 1936-37 edition of "Who's Who in America" lists 54 men and one woman from Chapel Hill. Every one of these has had some connection with the University at one time or another.

The one woman in the case is Dr. Susan G. Akers, head of the Library Science department.

In 1920 one in every 48 inhabitants of Chapel Hill was listed in "Who's Who in America," a ratio perhaps surpassed by no other community in the country, though Princeton, N. J., was close to it, says Roland M. Harper in the "Journal of the Elisha Mitchell Scientific Society, May, 1930.

The 1927 edition of "American Men of Science" contained the names of 40 men listed from Chapel Hill.

Harper points out in his article that in the whole U. S. there are about twice as many "Who's Who" people as scientists in some states, and three or four times as many in others, but in Chapel Hill the members are more nearly equal—40 scientists in 1927 and 49 Who's Who people in 1928.

### Maryland Congressman To Appear Before Jenkins' Class

## Lounge Discussion

Congressman David J. Lewis of the sixth district of Maryland will deliver an address tomorrow night at 8:30 in Hill Music hall on "The Future of the Constitution," presented by the Carolina Political union on behalf of the committee on the sesquicentennial of the formation of the constitution.

Lewis, who with Mrs. Lewis, will be located at the Carolina inn through Tuesday, will appear before W. L. Jenkins's class in political science 155 tomorrow morning at 9:30 in 213 Saunders. All persons from other departments who are interested are invited to attend. Lewis will conduct an open forum on "The Constitution."

### Open Forum

Following Lewis's address tomorrow night in Hill Music hall, there will be a reception and open forum in the main lounge of Graham Memorial to which the public is cordially invited.

Always a strong supporter of labor, Lewis has spent his youth, from the age of nine until he was 23, working in a coal mine. Afterward he studied law and was admitted to the Maryland bar in 1892. He served in the Maryland senate in the sessions of 1902 and 1904 and has served in the 62nd and 64th Congresses, and in the 72nd to the 75th. In 1917 President Wilson appointed him a member of the United States Tariff commission where he served until 1924.

Lewis's address will be the first of a series of addresses by leading thinkers in the field of constitutional theory and history that the committee is arranging for the sesquicentennial celebration.
