EMBASSY DEPART FROM NANKING

Shanghai, Sept. 20.—In the face of a Japanese threat to lay waste to the Chinese capital and as the result of a morning aerial raid in which 40 civilians were killed and 40 homes destroyed, the American embassy staff fled from Nanking tonight.

Ambassador from the United three years of membership. States Nelson Johnson, with his aides, boarded the American patrol boat, Luzon, stationed in the Yangtze river and turned up the river.

The Japanese had warned that foreigners would face danger of death from the air beginning at noon Tuesday. Japanese officials declared that Japan would not be responsible for loss of foreign life after that hour. The Americans planned to withdraw to Wuhu, 30 miles from Nanking, thereby observing the demand of the Japanese naval force.

Johnson's decision to withdraw roused bitter disappointment among Nanking officials, committee was appointed which bassador should remain as a gesture of loyalty and sympathy with China's cause in the conflict with Japan. "Students will definitely be using the entire equipment before May," said Mr. Woollen.

Last winter the University secured \$283,090 from P. W. A. to match its own \$346,000 in the construction of the gym, pool, and new women's dormitory.

Women's Building

Under the contract, the women's building was to be finished last August. Mr. Woollen stated that a slight time extension was secured in view of a five weeks idle period during spring rains. It is now occupied, although all painting will not be completed until the Christmas holidays.
