ROOSEVELT SAYS NATION DETERMINED TO AVOID WAR

Chicago, Oct. 5-President Roosevelt declared here today that the United States is "deternight, in Graham Memorial. mined to keep out of war." "Yet," he added, "we cannot insure against the disastrous effects of war and the dangers of involvement."
