

BRITISH ASK ITALY HER SPANISH STAND


London, Oct. 6-The British government today demanded immediate action by the Italian premier Mussolini on the Spanish situation.

He was given 24 hours to reply to an invitation by France and England to talk over the international complications arising from the war in Spain.

It was believed that the new British move was decided upon after cabinet members interpreted the speech yesterday by the President of the United States as opening the way for American cooperation in confining the war to Spain.

CHINESE ARMY STOPS JAPANESE ADVANCE

Shanghai, Oct. 6-Desperate Chinese soldiers today stemmed the tide of Japan's invaders, from Shanghai to the far north. In hand-to-hand combat near the city, the Japanese were driven back by sheer man-power.

In the north a fierce Chinese counter attack forced the invaders to abandon their siege of Techow and retreat.

Meanwhile, informed Japanese quarters in Peiping said that Japan intends to form a second autonomus state in north China of five provinces, if they are taken. The provinces are: Hopeh, Shantung, Chahar, Suiyuan and Shansi.

ROOSEVELT MAY CALL SPECIAL SESSION

Hyde Park, N. Y., Oct. 6-President Roosevelt returned home today from his western tour, hinting strongly that he may call a special session of congress sometime between November 8 and 16.

Speaking to reporters on the front porch of his country home here, he listed as his first objective wages and hours legislation, surplus crop control, government reorganization, and regional planning.

The president declined to say whether reorganization of the supreme court would be included or not.

Baltimore, Oct. 6-American friends of the Duke of Windsor and his wife, Wallis Warfield, formerly of Baltimore, revealed today that the ex-king may bring "Wally" home.
