Perry Explains Testing Service

(Continued from first page) sults of educational and vocational tests, through a study of his work experiences, and through the record of the student's work at the University. The even more important work of suggested treatment after diagnosis has not as yet been attempted," continued Dr. Perry. "After an analysis of a student's abilities has been made the next step is to locate that student's problems in those areas which offer most difficulty. For example, problems might fall in a financial area, in a vocational area, in an emotional area, an educational area, or a health area. From this diagnosis should come suggestions for changes in the course of study, for financial aid, for vocational choice changes, for additional avocational activities, or for a vocational try-out. Analysis, diagnosis, and suggested treatment are the three duties of a guidance clinic."

"Students will learn if they attempt subject matter which they are capable of learning and if they are properly motivated to learn. A guidance clinic along the lines which has just been described will do much to help the student fill both the requirements of the above statement," continued Dr. Perry. "Through its testing program and subsequent counseling service it can help the student to determine which of a group of professions or courses in which the student might find greatest success. And the second requirement of activation can be effectively brought about through the use of counseling techniques in the student-counselor interview. All of the testing data and other information collected concerning a student is brought to a focus in the counseling interview. Suggestions are then made and a program of work and play outlined."
