NATIONAL GUARD UNITS SENT TO STRIKE AREA

Akron, O., Nov. 20-Units of the Ohio national guard mobolized today for service at the Goodyear Tire and Rubber company, where 12,000 workers are idle because of a sit down strike.

Following the announcement of company officials that the plant would reopen Monday, union officials immediately said that picket lines would be placed around the plant which covers hundreds of acres in the heart of Akron.

Although no national guard units have been sent to the scene of the strike as yet, Adjutant General Emil F. Marx said that troops were being prepared for a possible mobilization. Two observers for the national guard are at the plant to watch progress of the strike.

Nearly 12,000 employes were affected as operations in all plants of the company were paralyzed by sit-down strikers, protesting against scheduled lay-

President John House, of the Goodyear local, of the united rubber workers of America said the strike lacked U. R. W. A. authorization. He announced, however, that a special meeting has been called for Sunday and should the majority call for a "strike vote" it would be necessary to authorize such a step.


House indicated that the company had violated seniority rights in a retrenchment schedule calling for the layoff of 1, 600 employes.


Union officials ordered evacuation of the plant and all but a few, who refused to leave, came out. The remaining strikers were expected to come out some time later in the day.
