According to Richard Frankensteen, UAWA international vice president, workers at the Long Beach, Calif. plant had "Y" Cabinets To "voted unanimously" for strike. At Kansas City, various committees are waiting for the call to strike; "soup kitchens" have already been set up.

The vice president added, however, "I can not yet give the exact date the men will be called out."

Frankensteen, who flew to St. Louis from Pittsburgh to address a meeting of CIO workers last night, indicated the St. Louis strike "is part of a carefully planned national campaign to unionize Ford."

He declared, "If it becomes necessary, we will completely tie up production by calling out our men in the various material supply companies which supply the Ford plants."

This method has not been applied so far because it involves the jobs of so many men.
