Berlin, March 1 .- Adolf Hitler's right hand man, Field Marshal General Herman Wilhelm Goering, today warned European powers that the German air force was ready not only to protect its own territory but also "ten millions of Germans on our borders."

Speaking at the third anniversary celebration of Germany's new air force, Goering said that his fleet was impatient to prove to the world that it is invincible.

Although official figures of the German air fleet are unknown, it is estimated that the country has approximately 2,000 first line fighting planes.


