And with his words will come elation to those young Thespians whose adous preparations have culminated in success and the obvious disappointment to their colleagues who will receive no prizes.

However, most of the young entertainers have already received their reward—in the pleasures of a visit to the campus and in the knowledge that they have performed in the Playmakers' theater, which is the ultimate in Carolina dramatics.

All through this last week members of 103 different groups—all part of the Dramatic association—have mingled in and about the Playmakers' theater, comparing notes and exchanging comments. Brought here mainly through the efforts of John Parker, executive secretary of the organization, they represent one of the most complete statewide cultural groups in America. And as they are all winners from their individual districts, they are only the better part of a vast crop of local dramatic talent.

Since last Sunday these high school junior high school, children's dramatic, college, and WPA groups have offered a varied program. They have presented children's plays, puppet plays, religious drama, comedy, tragedy, fantasy, and melodrama. NEW FRENCH CABINET PASSES FRESH CRISIS

Paris, March 25.—An uneasy situation was predominant today as the French cabinet averted a fresh crisis by approving Premier Leon Blum's proposal to obtain ratification by the chamber of deputies of only one of his financial proposals.

The cabinet, only 12 days old, approved a measure providing for the advancement of \$160,000,000 from the Bank of France to meet immediate expenses. It decided not to pass a second bill which proposed advancement of additional funds for defense needs.

Additional worry to the government came from strikes staged by metal workers in the Lille district.
