TWO NEW EVENTS TO FEATURE GAY SENIOR WEEK


Steak Supper And Picnic Planned **By President**


Joe Patterson, senior class head, says about the steak supper. No dates will be there to spoil the ALUMNI EXPECTED which will prevail, he says.
