Cavaliers Thirsting For First Victory Since Upset In 1932

One of the finest University of North Carolina football teams in years reaches the end of the 1939 trail at Kenan stadium tomorrow afternoon when it plays Virginia at 2 o'clock.

The Tar Heels will be overwhelming favorites to defeat the in and out Cavaliers and finish the year with eight wins, one loss, one tie and fourth place in the Southern conference. Virginia goes into the game with five games won and three lost and a deepset ambition to knock down Carolina for the first time since 1932 when it won 14-7, when Coach Chuck Collins used his second team most of the way.
