Among the special collections for which the library is famous are the Southern Historical Collection, directed by Dr. J. G. de-Roulhac Hamilton, and the Hanes Foundation for the Study of the Origin and Development of the Book.

Notable Collection

The Southern Collection, one of the most notable in the United States, includes all the "large and varied holdings of the library that relate in any way to the history of the Southern states and their people."

The special Hanes collection, relating to the history of the Hanes family and contains 565 incunabula items representing the work of 226 different printers in 41 cities of eight European countries.

Engineers are now at work making a topographical map of the area, so that officials here may decide where to locate the individual houses and where to lay the streets.

Under terms of the agreement the University is to furnish the site, streets, foundations, electric facilities, water, sewage lines and management of the project. Rent will be approximately \$30 monthly.

(Continued from page two) Direct negotiations with the Soviet Union, with regular progress reports to the UNO, were then established. Since this time there has been almost no mention of the problem in the daily press and it can only be assumed that these negotiations are meeting with very little difficulty.

The most important lesson to be gained from the Iranian Crisis is that peace can only be maintained by cooperation and objective thinking on these problems. Power politics and colonial imperialism have no place in our present world. If the UNO is going to deteriorate into a formation of blocs against any one of the major powers, it can only fail. We must cooperate to aid ourselves and to aid the backward and colonial peoples of the world. A world cannot exist half destitute and half prosperous. But first, let us realize that we cannot do these things alone.
