named the Genevieve B. Morehead Memorial Gallery, since it will house the private collections of paintings, china, glass, and other objects of my late wife."

Mr. Morehead was the chief of chemical research for Union Carbide and Carbon Corporation in New York. He is the holder of many patents on improvements in electric furnaces, and the pioneer on the development of acetylene gas.

"It is my hope that the youths who use this planetarium will advance the cause of science in the South," he said.

Earlier in the meeting of the trustees, Dr. Graham declared that it would add something lasting to the prestige and public service of the University, as no other educational institution in the United States has a planetarium at present.

"I wish that I might go back to the University with you and visit the students, but I am on my way to a luncheon with the governor," the Major said as he left the Capitol with Governor Cherry.

In 1931, the Major, who is a lover of music, and Rufus L. Patterson, gave the University the Morehead-Patterson Memorial tower and chimes.

as practicable, Mr. Morehead said. It may not be possible to open the planetarium immediately upon completion of the structure, however. This is because the rare Zeiss Planetarium instrument, which costs \$75,000 alone, is built only in Germany, and it is difficult if not impossible to have one built at the present time.

Negotiations, however, have already been initiated through government as well as private channels, and the trustees of the foundation are making every effort to secure the instrument and open the planetarium to the public at the earliest possible time.

Mr. Morehead, who served on the board of trustees of the Hayden Planetarium in New York at the time of its erection, said he was particularly anxious to provide one for his alma mater because he feels it will be of lasting interest and will add to the public service of the University.

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since no other college in the United States has a planetarium at the present time.

Mr. Morehead himself will serve as chairman of the foundation, and the other trustees will be Norman A. Cocke, attorney, and John L. Morehead, manufacturer and cousin of Mr. Morehead, both of Charlotte.

The Morehead Planetarium and Memorial Gallery will be entirely separate and apart from the University's present art department and gallery, Gov. R. Gregg Cherry said in accepting the gift. "The main gallery will not be used for any other exhibits whatsoever. Mr. Morehead conceived this as a lasting monument to his beloved wife, and it will be limited to her personal and private collections, with no additions ever."

admission at Woman's College is to be continued, as only 17 servicewomen have returned there.

A balance in enrollment among the several schools and colleges of each institution as indicated by a base pre-war period will be preserved, the session was told. With this principle maintained, a scale of priorities of admission for students meeting entrance requirements will be followed in the order as set forth.

Graham Pleased

Dr. Frank P. Graham, University president, was pleased by the decisions made by the full board of trustees. "It was a good meeting," he said.

David Clark, one of the nearly 100 trustees present in Raleigh, called the board's attention to a resolution passed previously that a department of tutoring be set up at State College, with a full-time professor be hired to head it.

Three new members were nominated to the Board of Trustees to fill unexpired terms as the session neared its end. Victor Bryant, Durham, was elected for the longest term. Second was Edward Pate, of Laurinburg, and third was John W. Umstead, Jr., Chapel Hill. Also nominated were Kemp D. Battle, Rocky Mount, and Mrs. Gertrude McKie, Sylva.

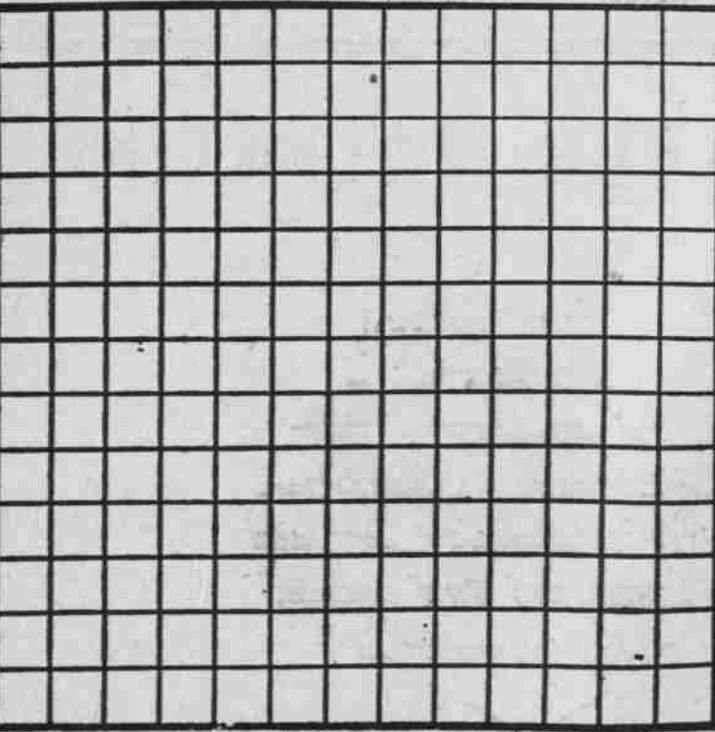
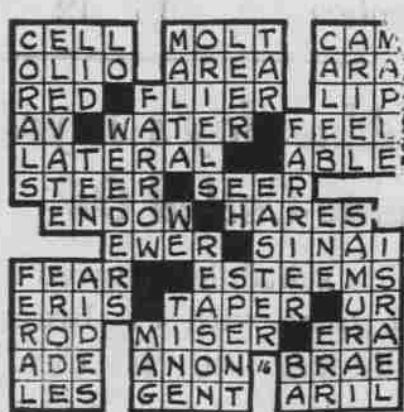
Archie Allen, Raleigh, was nominated secretary to the Board of Trustees to succeed A. B. Alexander, also of Raleigh.
