'Low Wages Cause Shortage'—Bowles

Washington, March 9.—Chester Bowles charges that low wages, not price controls, are primarily the cause of clothing and building material shortages. The economic stabilizer said there is a clothing shortage because mill workers who make the cloth have always been miserably paid and textile production has suffered. He said the same was true of building material shortages.

Commission Includes Members of Congress

Washington, March 9.—The White House has announced that four members of Congress, two from the Senate and two from the House, will be included on the commission which will review the results of the Navy's atomic bomb tests. Mr. Truman plans to name nine or ten persons to his atomic bomb commission.

Work Completed On Atomic Test Planes

Philadelphia, March 9.—The Navy has completed work on the 56 planes it will use in the atomic bomb tests on Navy ships in May. The planes, all modifications of the Grumman Hellcat fighter, will be loaded on a carrier at Norfolk, Virginia, and taken to the Pacific.

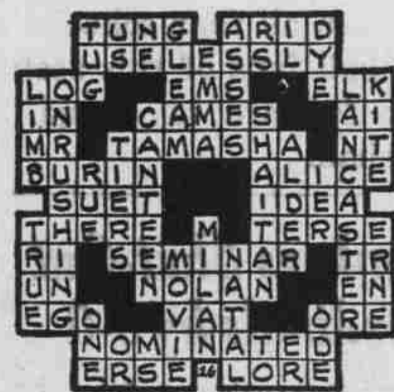
President Truman Returns From Trip

And so we have accepted this challenge, we have come back, we have returned!

potential harm; it may infect every aspect of American action and policy unless we learn to look at the world from a composite perspective and turn a jaundiced eye on American and British, as well as Russian policies.

If war comes, it will be a tragic farce. It will not be caused by differences of interest of an incompatible nature, but caused by stupidity of leadership and a willingness of the people to be led into suspicion, and war, because they won't apply understanding to facts, "obvious" and otherwise.

I personally feel the need for one clear voice to say, "let's end this nonsense, snap out of a mental and moral lethargy." If this voice was stilled on April 12th, then the solution must come from the people—a change in attitude adapted to the thinking needs of an atomic age. The alternative is painfully obvious to relatively few.
