

Juniors Vote On May Dance

Assessment Needed To Finance Frolic

The first Junior-Senior dance since the war may be given in May, depending upon the vote of the Junior class tomorrow, according to Alec Veasey, president of the juniors.

All members of the Junior class may vote Wednesday in dormitories, fraternities, sororities, and the Y on the following two questions:

1. I approve a Junior Class assessment of \$2.00 for the Spring quarter.

2. The University has my approval to attach a class fee to my bill, if the class favors the fee by vote.

If the juniors vote to assess themselves \$2 for a Junior-Senior dance, Lewis Cotton, chairman of the class dance committee, will sign a band immediately for some time in May. Cotton has already contacted Dean Hudson's and Bubbles Becker's bands and an All Girl band.

The previous junior vote on the dance question was not official because a quorum, consisting of 800, did not cast ballots.

Johnny Jones, chairman of the class election committee, will have ballot boxes at every dormitory, sorority, and fraternity on Wednesday. Only those who live in town may vote at the Y.

Coach Ben Carnevale, whose quintet is putting on a great show for his hometown cage fans, is confronted with the problem of mapping out a defense strategy to bottle up the Aggies Bob "Foot-hills" Kurland, seven foot giant, who has been the big threat in the Oklahoma attack all season. Coach Carnevale will rely on Horace "The Old Man of College Basketball" McKinney, to turn the trick and a battle of giants might be staged in the title engagement tonight.

The Tar Heels went through an hour and a half practice session on the Garden Boys Club court yesterday afternoon and the squad appeared in top shape for the cage classic with the Aggies. The Western champs arrived in New York yesterday and took a short workout following a long trip from Kansas City.

The Aggies gained the finals by whipping California by a one-sided score of 52-35, as Skyscraper Kurland tossed in 29 points for the winners. The Pacific Coast champs accompanied Oklahoma A & M to New York to tangle with the runner-ups, Ohio State, in a consolation match prior to the championship encounter.

John "Killer" Dillon leads the Tar Heel scorers in the team's two Garden appearances with a total of 31 points. He has registered 12 hook shots and seven charity throws. Jim Jordan follows the ambidextrous hook artist with 22 markers, while Bob Paxton and Bones McKinney trail with 21 and 20 respectively. Don Anderson has a ten point total for the two games. Jim White has collected seven points and Taylor Thorne has dropped in six tallies.

Coach Carnevale will send his regular starting five on the court tonight against the Oklahomans which includes Jordan and White, guards; McKinney, center; Dillon and Paxton, for-

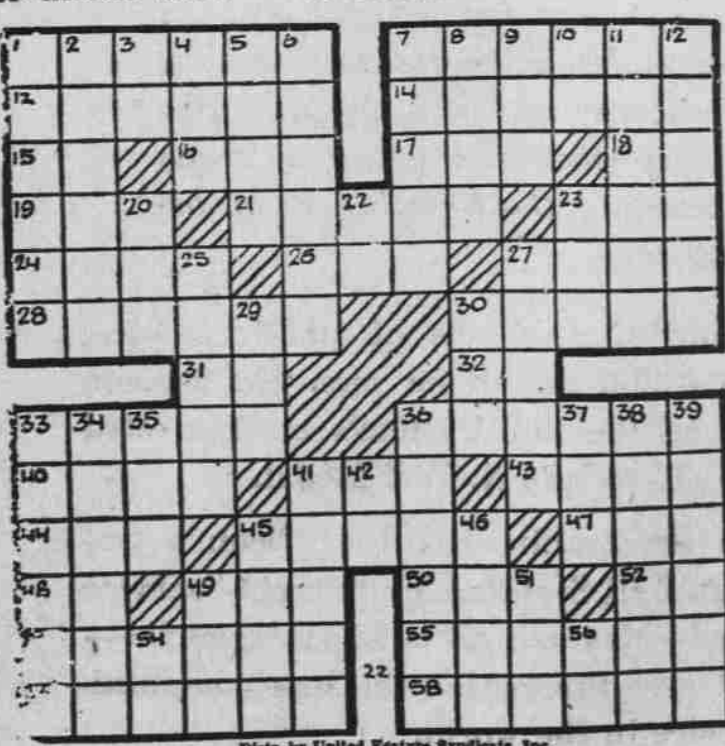
