# **Iran Quarters** Say Red Treaty **Expected Soon**

#### **Further Russ-Iran Talks Postponed**

Tehran, April 4.-Iranian political quarters predict that a new treaty of alliance between Iran and Russia may result from negotiations now in progress in Tehran. Such a treaty, the Iranians say, would provide for closer economic ties between the two countries, and might also grant Russia the use of warm water ports on the Iranian coast of the Persian Gulf. Representatives of both nations are reported optimistic about the outcome of their negotiations now program. that Russia has promised unconditionally to withdraw its troops by May 6th.

#### Senate Rebuffs Truman On Minimum Wage Bill

Washington, April 4.-President Truman has been handed a double rebuff by the Senate on the National Minimum Wage bill. The chamber today voted 76 to 6 to raise the minimum wage from 40 to 60 cents an hour, despite the President's demand for a sliding scale going from 65 cents to 75 cents in four years. The Senate also reaffirmed a farm parity rider to the poses of the senate. bill, although last week Mr. Truman said that he would veto the bill if the rider was attached.
