

# Final Sesquicentennial Features Nation's Leading Educators

## Two-Day Program Begins Friday Night With Address by Gov. R. Gregg Cherry

The concluding and climactic event of the University's Sesquicentennial celebration, which began in 1939 with the commemoration of the founding of the University, will bring more than 250 delegates from colleges and universities and 150 from learned societies throughout the country to Chapel Hill Friday and Saturday.

Governor R. Gregg Cherry will be the speaker at a dinner in Lenoir Hall at 6 o'clock Friday night when the two-day program opens. In attendance will be delegates, University Trustees, recipients of honorary degrees and members of the Legislative, alumni and University Sesquicentennial committees.

### Concert in Hill

Following the dinner there will be a concert at 8 o'clock in Hill Hall, after which John Walker, Chief Curator, National Gallery of Art, Washington, will give an address on American painting. Concluding the Friday evening program will be a special exhibition of American painting and a reception in Person Hall Art Gallery.

President Edmund E. Day of Cornell University and President Frank P. Graham will be the principal speakers on the program Saturday morning, which will begin with a colorful academic procession at 10 o'clock. The various groups will form on designated centers on the campus and march to Memorial Hall.

President Day will speak on "The Mobilization of Education in a Free Society" and President Graham's subject will be "A Look Ahead."

Dr. William M. Dey, Chief Marshal, will present each of the 350 delegates.

Following the two addresses, 42 honorary degrees will be awarded. This is the largest number of honorary degrees ever presented by the University on any one occasion, but is less than have been awarded by other institutions on similar occasions.

The concluding event will be a luncheon at Lenoir Hall at 1 o'clock.
