

Join Academic Procession **Event Will Bring Brilliant Conclusion To Colorful Sesquicentennial Ceremony**

President Frank P. Graham will present honorary degrees from the University to 39 people this morning in Memorial Hall in a program which will follow a colorful academic procession of the 350 Sesquicentennial delegates and many University faculty members. The procession will start at 10:20 o'clock and the program at 10:30. Dr. Edmund E. Day, president of Cornell University, and Dr. Graham will be the morning's principal speakers. President



Day's topic will be "The Mobilization of Education in a Free Society" and President Graham's "A Look Ahead."

All faculty offices will be closed for the program and there will be seats for students and faculty members wishing to attend. **Greatest Number**

In awarding a large number of honorary degrees, this being the greatest number ever presented here at one time, the University will be following a long-established custom of colleges and universities on such occasions. Administration officials have withheld names of the recipients, wishing to make them public first today at Memorial Hall. It is rumored, however, that some of the best-known figures in the United States are on campus now to receive University recognition. It has been revealed that 23 of the recipients are eminent scholars-nine in the natural sciences, six in humanities. Fifteen are in public life and business. Twenty-six were born in the South and two others, born elsewhere, are now working in the South. Fifteen have or have had definite connections with North Carolina. Eight are alumni, and all but three are listed in "Who's
