Order Takes Effect Shortly After Noon

The White House, May 21-President Truman this afternoon seized the soft coal mines, effective tomorrow. But White House Secretary Charles Ross indicates that the A. F. of L. United Mine Workers have yet to give a promise that they will keep the miners in the pit after the strike truce expires on Saturday. Interior Department Secretary J. A. Krug has been named federal manager of the mines.

Vice-Admiral Ben Morrell, the war-time head of the Seabees, has been named by Interior Secretary Krug as his deputy to take over the coal mines tomorrow. . The government will officially take title to the mines just after noon tomorrow. Krug has called John L Lewis to his office to appeal to him to keep the miners on the job.
