Wallace To Talk **On Prague Council** Wednesday Night

James Wallace, who returned to Chapel Hill this week from Prague, will deliver his report on the proceedings of the Prague World Student conference in Hill Hall at 8:00 next Wednesday evening.

UNC was one of the fifteen U.S. universities, and the only one in the south, invited to send delegates to the worldwide assembly, which was in session from August 18-31. The expenses of Wallace, who was selected by a joint faculty-student board to represent Carolina, totalled nearly \$900, all donated by campus organizations. Wallace's report next Wednesday, according to Walt Stuart, chairman of the preparatory committee, will cover both the general work of the student conference and his own as one of 25 U.S. delegates.




